Key results:

- Many more Christians than Muslims were killed by jihadist violence (2021: 77.9% vs 21.6%; 2020: 77.4% vs 22.1%). The remainder of those killed by jihadist violence were African Traditional Religionists (ATRs) where the level remained static (2021: 0.5%; 2020: 0.5%). These percentages do not include security personnel or jihadists killed, nor people killed in a context other than jihadist violence.
- The majority of Muslims were killed by jihadists (Boko Haram, ISWAP, armed Fulani herdsmen, 'bandits'); not by Christians.
- The numbers given are just the 'tip of the iceberg'. Incidents involving killings often represent a whole gamut of violence and suffering: communities raided and/or permanently occupied; women and girls raped and/or abducted; fields destroyed and/or occupied; people robbed from their properties and livelihoods; people driven from their homelands into dire situations of internal displacement.
